# Chairperson's Report

In 2022 our congregation was able to enjoy one of the best years we've had for some time. In part this was due to the restrictions relating to COVID 19 being eased, which meant last year we met as a congregation every Sunday at our building and none of our services had to be conducted on-line. However COVID-19 is still in the community and a number of our congregation have suffered its effects. By applying appropriate precautions our church has been able to return to a "normal" pattern of life.

Our return to regular weekly worship services followed by yummy morning teas has only been part, albeit an important part, of our church's activities during the past year. There have been many other events and activities, both within and outside of the church; some of which were formally organised and others were arranged on a more casual basis. In no particular order these included:

- Coffee, Cake and Fellowships mornings Held weekly on Wednesday mornings by the ladies; they started the year meeting at *La Belle Pâtisserie* and then moved to *Seven Trees Coffee* in Erskine. The gentlemen met fortnightly on Tuesdays at the *Taste of Italy* in Halls Head.
- Lunches there were a number of fellowship lunches held at Church after services, and some impromptu lunches held at local fish 'n chips or cafes.
- The Movies various informal groups went to the cinema to see the latest movies. Many of the congregation saw the movie "Northern Safari", (which is set in outback Australia in the 1950's), at the church when we held a soup and movie night in August.
- Fundraising there were various fundraisers throughout the year including an appeal for the people of Ukraine and Tear Australia;
- Home groups Due to the impact of COVID 19 we currently only have two home groups operating. They have met weekly to share fellowship, learn more about God's word and care for one another. One of my aims for next year is to encourage the establishment of at least one new home group;

- The Mission Planning Workshop In February members of the congregation participated in a workshop, ably facilitated by Rev Rob Douglas, to review our church's Vision and Mission statements as part of the process for calling a minister or pastor;
- Stations of the Cross as has been our tradition for some years (COVID permitting), SMUC joined St Damien's Catholic Church in Dawesville for the Good Friday "Stations of the Cross"; followed by a hot cross bun morning tea on a lovely sunny morning;
- Seven week series on Joshua in collaboration with Billabong Church and sharing speakers each week, sometimes in person and sometimes via a video link, we enjoyed a wonderful series of sermons exploring the book of Joshua;
- "The Prayer Room" for the first time, with assistance from Billabong Church, we participated in the Prayer Room in the lead up to Pentecost Sunday;
- Royal Life Saving Society a first aid demonstration was held at the church in September;
- Kings Park a group travelled up to Kings Park to see the beautiful wildflower displays and enjoy a convivial lunch,
- Christmas At the start of Advent we held our fantastic annual carols evening. The theme was "The six senses of Christmas" and the evening was greatly enjoyed by the large crowd who attended. The evening was followed by our regular Sunday Advent services leading up to the Christmas Day service.

During the past two years the Leadership Team has been working through a myriad of complex regulations and documentation in preparation for the SMUC putting out a call for a new minister or pastor. After much planning, discussion, prayers and meetings, plus what seemed like never ending paperwork, two weeks prior to Christmas 2022 the Pastoral Relations Committee (PRC) granted permission for SMUC to offer a position for a 0.4 FTE Pastor. This allows us to employ a Pastor for two days a week (15 hours). SMUC is required to advertise the position and it is hoped that a new Pastor will commence their duties around April 2023. After all the frustrations and setbacks of 2021 and 2022, this is a very positive step forward for our church community and will open up new opportunities for growth for our church and potentially with the local community as well.

2022 was a year of visiting speakers. We were blessed to have a wide variety of visiting speakers who provided thought provoking and sometimes challenging messages to our congregation. Speakers included Suzy Thomas (UCA Moderator), Rev Dr Andrew Williams (UCA WA General Secretary), Rev Lesley de Grussa, Dr Cheryl Lim (Tear Fund), Dr David Liaw (OMF International), Mr Steve Hall (Adult and Teen Challenge), Mr Tony McAlinden who spoke on prison probation reform, Mr Neil Masters (YouthCare), Mrs Noella Ross, Mr Doug Burtenshaw; and Rev Luke Williams, Mr Yoy Alberastine and Mr Samuel Annan from Billabong Church, all of whom contributed to our 7 week sermon series on Joshua.

The visiting speakers were in addition to our "in-house" regular speakers, Mrs Frances Davy, Mr Piet Speyers and Rev Mike Fawcett who do a fantastic job. Additionally we had a number of wonderful "congregation led" services. Who could forget the joyous Easter Sunday service led by Mr Ken Lehmann and the Advent Carols organised by the Thompson family?

New technology is finally coming to the SMUC. When participating in the 7 week series based on the Biblical Book of Joshua in conjunction with Billabong Church we trialled the use of live videolinking. The technology took a while to set up but once it worked, it was great! On speaking to various congregational members afterwards it appeared that people are happy to do it again. We had a zoom message, recorded messages and a number of video clips, short films and music during various services. With the change in the way technology is used, one of the LT projects for 2023 is to review and if needed, start updating the software and hardware used during Sunday services so the SMUC can stay current and able to access this technology when needed.

A new project trialled in 2022 was participating in "The Prayer Room". The Prayer Room is a non-denominational activity and has been run on a state, national and international level for a number of



years. The SMUC Prayer Room participants met every day for a few hours in the Fellowship Room in the week leading up to Pentecost Sunday for individual and group prayer, and activities. On Pentecost Sunday a special celebration service was held followed by lunch afterwards. It was so successful that we plan to participate again this year in the lead up to Pentecost Sunday. Thank you to the team of Frances Davy, Kerry McCrie, Julie Lehmann and Sherryl Smith who did a fantastic job and I am excited to see the SMUC participating in 2023. A bonus from the Prayer Room was the establishment of a regular Sunday morning mini–prayer session of 15 minutes commencing at 9.00am which is open to everyone who wishes to join in.

#### What's new at the SMUC?

After the two break-ins in 2021 the security at the church was upgraded. We now have a roller shutter door at the back of the storeroom and a double security front door.

In February 2022 the LT were approached by the Falcon Lions Club to use the SMUC Fellowship Room and facilities for their meeting premises as they were in need of a new "home". The Falcon Lions Club now have a written contract and started to use the SMUC in May 2022 and they love it. Their members have said: "*Thank you* for the use of the venue. The venue is perfect for our needs", and "Once again reiterating how happy we are to be using SMUC rooms for our meetings. Such a warm welcoming space".

Our church has continued our tradition of supporting charities and in 2022 we donated over 10% of our income to assist our community. In addition to food for the *Grocery Box*, we have donated much needed funds to YouthCare, Adult and Teen Challenge WA, and provided financial assistance for various appeals and mission services. The collection of recyclable cans and bottles for "Cash for Cans" has grown in strength, raising approximately \$500 in 2022. All of which was donated to a local charity; Mums Cottage. Please keep collecting your recyclables and placing in the special bin located in the church foyer.

This year SMUC received a request from one of our visiting speakers, Tony McAlinden. He asked if we would work with two

other churches on a special project to collect toys for children up to 14 years of age. On the first Sunday of Advent, 8 large boxes of wonderful toys were handed to Tony for delivery to Bunbury Prison for the prisoners to give to their children as Christmas gifts. It is wonderful project that supports the mental health and wellbeing of prisoners and their families, and provides so much joy too. Thank you for supporting this very special community project so generously.

Our church is a volunteer based organisation and we could not run without our volunteers. Thank you to everyone who has worked in any role in our church during 2022. The roles are many and varied; some are highly visible and others are more "hidden". Thank you to all our very special Enablers; this includes the people who provide our famous morning teas; the welcomers at the front door who offer a cheery good morning as we arrive for Sunday service; the worship leaders and speakers who spent hours planning and researching their words to us in the weeks leading up to Sunday services; the musicians and singers who arrive an hour early on Sunday morning to practise as a group to lead us in glorious songs of praise during service; the readers who study the allocated bible reading for the service so they can speak clearly; the praver leaders who prayer for us and with us; the Sunday School leaders who carefully plan an age appropriate and fun activity for our children and all the workers "behind the scenes." The audio visual operators who ensure we have words on the screen and sound; the people who plan and arrange our fabulous decorations for the various events in the church; the LT rep who every week ensures everything is left clean and tidy as they lock up the building after service; the gentlemen who keep the maintenance up to date; the volunteer drivers who chauffeur church members to services and appointments; our very able Treasurer, David Jessup; the Leadership Team who donated so much time this year (more than previous years because of the Minister/pastor call), and those who collate and create the Messenger, contact book, update the Facebook and Web pages. ALL OF THESE PEOPLE ARE VERY SPECIAL as they have generously donated their time and efforts to help the SMUC run smoothly and I offer a very LARGE THANK YOU.

With great sadness I confirm that three members of the Leadership Team are stepping down at this year's AGM. Piet Speyers and Andrew Gibson have completed their terms and decided not to seek re-election, and Kerry Lawson has resigned from the Leadership Team to go on a long awaited (and much anticipated) holiday around Australia with her husband Ron. On behalf of the congregation I sincerely thank Kerry, Andrew and Piet for their cheerful participation and dedication to our church, and for their work on the Leadership Team in all the different roles they have so capably performed. Andrew and Piet are not stepping away entirely, as they have decided to continue with the planning of the Speakers List and all three will continue their respective roles on the Enablers List and the other work that they do for our church. I look forward to welcoming new members onto the Leadership Team to join Sherryl Smith, Andrew Telfer and me as we continue serving our church.

There is always a risk that I will miss someone when offering thank you's but I particularly want to thank my loving husband, Peter, who every week researches, prepares and sends out the Messenger to our church community. Peter also compiles the Enablers List, the SMUC Contact book and the AGM Booklet along with various posters, PowerPoints and anything else I ask of him. Thank you for your dedication and patience.

In closing I would like to remind us all of the following;-

"A church is not a building but a community where people are sharing their lives and supporting each other through Fellowship, caring, friendship and a shared faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

South Mandurah UC congregation have supported each other through COVID-19, illnesses, injuries and many other trials and tribulations. Fortunately these are offset with many happy events full of laughter and love throughout the year. As we move into 2023 I know this spirit of love, friendship, support, faith and generosity will continue to grow in OUR church community and we will be stronger as a community because of these wonderful gifts.

One of the highlights of our Ministry during 2022 was the 7 week series on the book of Joshua run in collaboration with Billabong Uniting Church. Rev. Luke Williams, Yoy Alberastine and Samuel Annan from Billabong UC all delivered messages to our congregation. We also appreciated the visit and ministry of Rev Rob Douglas, the Presbytery's mission consultant. Rob will be providing ongoing support and guidance to the congregation relating to our church's mission.

The services continue to be recorded each week and they are then posted on You-tube, Facebook and our website. Thank you to Robyn and Piet Speyers for all the work they do recording, editing and uploading the videos.

The two coffee morning fellowship groups continue to provide forums for caring and sharing. Everybody is encouraged to remember that these groups provide good opportunities for inviting friends along to join in. This is a great way to share with others and show how our faith impacts our life.

Two important ministry areas are pastoral care and prayer ministry. Most of this ministry is done by members of the congregation especially in the home groups. However there is need for a more coordinated team approach to ensure that as many people as possible are receiving pastoral support and contributing to the "prayer and care" of each other.

A prayer time before the service week is held each week at 9 am. This is an opportunity for any or all members of the congregation to pray together.

# ✤ Small Groups

#### Home Groups

Home groups have an important role to play in our church leading to increased spiritual growth and promoting friendships, care and general support for one other. Following the COVID 19 epidemic of 2020 - 2021 there were only two home groups meeting weekly, and those groups have grown and are doing extremely well. For a number of reasons there is a need for more home groups to be established. The reasons include increasing the opportunity for people to participate by holding the meetings at different times, that the current home groups are close to maximum capacity (which reduces the opportunity for one on one conversations and overcrowds people's homes), and to avoid the leaders of the existing home groups being over worked. It would be fantastic to see the emergence of two or more new home groups in 2023. If you are interested in starting a new group or would like to attend one of the existing groups, please speak to any member of the leadership team.

# Prayer Group

The prayer group has continued to meet every Sunday morning prior to the service at 9-00 a.m. in the Fellowship Hall. This initiative arose as a result of the desire for such a group, as expressed by members in the 2020 congregational survey, and from the Prayer room which was leading up to Pentecost Sunday. The prayer group is open and welcoming to anybody who wishes to attend.

## Coffee Fellowship

The ladies' and gentlemen's fellowship coffee mornings have proven to be very popular, with increasing numbers attending. The ladies met weekly and initially patronised the "La Belle Patisserie" coffee shop in Northport (Wannanup) before switching to the Seven Trees Coffee cafe in Erskine later in the year. The gentlemen met fortnightly at "A Taste of Italy" café in the Farmer Jacks Halls Head Shopping Centre. The coffee mornings are open to everyone and give attendees the opportunity for companionship and stimulating conversation over delicious coffee and pastries.


#### **Community Groups**

# ✤ Property Report

The Church maintenance group were joined by Keith Johnston during the year, and we continued to maintain our church building in good condition. The work included:

1) Sealing the leaking skylight in worship room for the second time. Hopefully it is now fixed;

- 2) The water supply back flow valve was checked in December by a plumber;
- 3) The fire extinguishers were regularly checked;
- A busy bee was held to repair the fence along the Old Coast Road. A number of the posts had been damaged by white ants;
- 5) Security for the building was improved following break-ins on 11 September and 29 October 2021. A roller door was fitted to the external store room door and security flyscreens have been fitted to the front door.
- 6) All the fluorescent light tubes and starters were replaced in the worship and hall areas.
- 7) Removal of the palm tree near the kitchen door; and
- 8) Miscellaneous minor maintenance items were done around the church.

Some of the work was done by the men of the church, who generously donated their time and skills; so a big thank you goes to them.

The Community Services group has continued to do the gardening around the building. These are people working off their community service commitments, and the work is done at no cost to the church. Thank you to Brad and his team.

In the coming year we are considering repainting the kitchen.

**2021 AGM minutes** – no matters were raised. It was moved by the chair and approved by consensus that the minutes be accepted.

#### **Annual Reports**

Raelyn Punch spoke on the 2021 Annual Report Booklet with all Church reports contained in this document. With the report having been made available to the congregation via electronic circulation and some printed versions being available at the church prior to the meeting, all reports contained in the booklet were taken as read. No questions or matters were raised regarding any of the church reports. The reports were accepted by consensus.

#### Treasurer's report

For confidentiality reasons, the Treasurer's report has been deleted from the Website version of the Annual Report. Members may request a copy of the Annual Report from Raelyn Punch, Chair of the SMUC Leadership Team.

#### **Elections for LT membership**

There were two vacancies on the Leadership Team. Piet Speyers' term had concluded and the second position had been vacant for the past year.

There were two nominations for election to the Leadership Team; Sherryl Smith and Piet Speyers Each nominee gave a short two minute presentation to the meeting.

The chairperson explained who was eligible to vote. As per UCA guidelines, a closed ballot was conducted with a majority vote required to elect a nominee. Alison Yule and Andrew Telfer were approved by the meeting to act as count officials for the election.

Piet Speyers and Sherry Smith were both elected by a significant majority. The chairperson congratulated and welcomed both members to the Leadership Team. **Presbytery** /**Synod Representative** – John Lawrence is our current representative. As no nominees were received the LT will ask John if he wishes to continue as the SMUC representative.

#### **General Business**

#### The chairperson discussed the following matters:

#### 1) **COVID** 19

- a) SMUC continues to follow the guidelines set by the UCA. Recent changes will allow speakers, worship leaders, singers and musicians to take off their masks when on the stage.
- b) COVID certificate checks members were advised that over the next few weeks people will be asked to show their COVID certificates to Raelyn Punch and a record will be kept of those who have shown them.
- c) The chairs in the worship area have been spaced at 2 sq. metres as per current WA government guidelines.
- 2) **NCLS** (National Church Life Survey ) The completed survey forms will be sent off this coming week.

#### 3) Paying visiting speakers

The LT has decided to offer payment to all visiting speakers including mileage. They can accept payment or ask for the payment to be sent to a charity with a registered ABN of their choice. Speakers with paid employment are not included.

#### 4) Falcon Lions Club

The Falcon Lions Club has asked the LT if they can use the SMUC hall and facilities for a trial meeting on the 15<sup>th</sup> March. If the trial is considered to be a success the Lions Club will be using the building for their twice monthly meetings on the 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Tuesdays. Use has been granted and the club will pay a fee to use the facilities.

#### 5) Break-ins

The members were advised the church was broken into twice last year and some losses and damage were sustained. An insurance claim has been submitted to UCA and approval received. The LT has decided to fit a roller shutter to the external store room doors and two security screens to the church front door. The overall security has been reviewed and found to be appropriate.

#### 6) New Minister update

UCA Presbytery has noted that SMUC desires a new minister but it is unlikely a minister will be available until late 2023 because very few are being trained or are available to be called. All the documentation previously requested by the UCA Presbytery has been supplied and new requests for information are being addressed.

In the meantime, the LT are exploring various options on behalf of the congregation. These options include, but are not limited to, our "in house" speakers continuing to deliver the message, use of visiting speakers, employing a supply minister, and utilising recorded messages or live video links with another UCA church.

The LT is also exploring the option of using the services of a lay pastor. There is the possibility of a lay pastor being available from the Billabong UC Church.

#### 7) Wooden Steps

Lindsay Dunning was thanked for making the additional wooden steps for access to the stage area and for producing the Lenten crosses.

#### **Questions from the floor**

- 1) Judy Law moved a vote of thanks to the Leadership Team, especially Raelyn Punch, for all the work done in 2021. Carried by consensus and applause.
- 2) Web page Robyn Speyers would like some backup support with the web page. The chairperson encouraged everyone to offer our support in back up roles for Robyn.
- 3) Rev. Mike Fawcett asked the LT to regularly monitor the membership list and ensure it is kept current as in his experience churches did not keep correct membership records
- 4) Rev. Mike Fawcett suggested the LT consider the idea of a simple midweek communion service being run, possibly monthly for those who cannot get to the Sunday communion. Rev. Mike said he was happy to continue offering communion in the homes of those who cannot attend the Sunday service due to health or mobility issues.

The meeting was closed in prayer at 11.45am by Rev Mike Fawcett, and was followed by a shared lunch in the Fellowship Room.
