Following Jesus

I like the story of the young woman who wanted to go to college, but her heart sank when she read the question on the application blank that asked, "Are you a leader?" Being both honest and conscientious, she wrote, "No," and returned the application, expecting the worst. To her surprise, she received this letter from the college: "Dear Applicant: A study of the application forms reveals that this year our college will have 1,452 new leaders. We are accepting you because we feel it is imperative that they have at least one follower."



In the text for this week (John 1:43-51), Phillip comes to Nathanael and proclaims that he has found the one whom Moses wrote about. He is Jesus of Nazareth. While we do not know what expression Nathanael had on his face when he responded, I think that it is safe to say that his response revealed a cynical sneer. "Can anything good come from Nazareth?" Answered Phillip: "Come and see."

You see, Christianity has the same problem. The churches are full of those sure of themselves. Some may even get to the point where they believe very little that they're told. They sit back under the fig tree with the sneer of a Nathanael and ask, "Can anything good come from our church?" People come in and out the doors of our church with a critical eye. Scepticism is not a modern virtue. Doubting Thomases have been around since the dawn of time. By nature we don't want to be led. We want to lead; but, in the church, it is imperative that we have followers. In fact it is imperative for all of us to be followers.

Nathanael learned this. He was sceptical at first but he was transformed when he met Christ. He became a follower because Phillip invited him.

Let me ask you: What was it that Phillip saw in Christ that moved him to follow, that stirred him so much that he invited his friend Nathanael. Come and see what? What did Phillip see in Jesus of Nazareth? What do you see in Jesus, and if you met Him; what would he see in you? When did you last invite someone to follow Jesus? Have you seen someone's life transformed through their acceptance of Jesus? None of these seemingly simple questions are easy, and finding the answers through self reflection and your faith is challenging. Do you truly follow Jesus?
