OUR DEFIBRILLATOR

The defibrillator can be operated by anyone that follows the directions on the cabinet to use it. It then helps the operator through the stages of use. For safety and security, the white cabinet that contains the defibrillator cannot be opened until 000 has been phoned for the code to open it up attained from St John Safe.

Anyone who would like to attend a one hour demonstration of the operation of the defibrillator, is most welcome to come along on Monday 29th July, **commencing at 1pm**. There is no cost to attend. An instructor from St John Safe, will be conducting the



free demonstration which is a one hour session, commencing at 1.00pm. Afternoon Tea will be available afterwards. Please let Sherryl Smith. know if you are attending.

This is an opportunity to learn how to use the defibrillator to help someone who has had a heart attack and/or guide another helper through the stages of resuscitation, until the ambulance arrives.
